


And here are the Winners, in the order we plan to read them, chosen by the members of the Harrison Township Library Tuesday Bookgroup.


# Summer

#### The Great Believers by Rebecca Makkai (2018)



The novel explores themes of love, loss, friendship, and the devastating impact of the disease on the LGBTQ+ community. New York Times Top ten books of 2018.


## The Personal Librarian by Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray (2021)

The novel raises questions about identity, race, and power, and sheds light on a little-known figure from history.






Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus (2021)
